The Ruaha Law Review is a peer-reviewed journal committed to publishing high-quality legal scholarship that engages with contemporary legal issues, promotes critical analysis, and advances the development of law in Africa and globally.

Scope and Thematic Areas

Submissions are welcome in, but not limited to, the following areas of law:

- Environmental and Natural Resources Law

- Legal Ethics and Professional Responsibility
- Technology, Cyber Law, and Data Protection

Submission Process

- Include a cover letter with your full name, affiliation, and a brief biography (150 words).
- All submissions will undergo **double-blind peer review**.

Any submissions to the editorial **MUST** comply with the following requirements:

1. The submission must be original.
 2. **Language:** Submissions must be in English
 3. The submission (or part thereof) should not have been published elsewhere prior.
 4. The main heading should be Maiandra GD, with capitals, font size 12, and in bold.
 5. Subheadings should be in Maiandra GD, capitals, font size 12 numbered consecutively.
 6. Manuscripts must be typed in Maiandra GD, font size 12.
 7. Footnotes should be in font 10. No other form of referencing, apart from footnotes, will be accepted.
- Footnotes should appear at the end of the page and must be numbered consecutively. Footnotes should follow the **Oxford Standard for Citation of Legal Authorities (OSCOLA)** or another recognized citation style.
8. Proper nouns or acronyms should be written in full the first time and may subsequently be written in the abbreviated form: e.g. the Tanzania Law Reports (TLR).
 9. Self-made words should be in smart single quotes: e.g. ‘*Ujamaa*’.

10. Words in foreign languages (*qucquid plantator solo solo cedit, locus standi, litera legs etc*) should be italicized.
11. Use UK English.
12. Double quotation marks should be indented to a half inch (0.5”) on both sides, should be in Maiandra GD, and font size 11.
13. All quotations should be indented to a half inch (0.5”) on both sides, should be in Maiandra GD, and font size of 11.
14. Articles should average between 5,000 and 9,000 words (excluding footnotes) in length; case analyses should be 1,500-2,500 words; comments/notes should not exceed 3,000 words and book reviews should be between 500-1,500 words.
15. Authors should indicate in the manuscripts their academic qualifications and professional status.
16. Sources must be listed at the end of each article, giving full details.
17. The first reference to books: e.g. M N Shaw (1991) *International Law* (Cambridge: Grotius Publications, 1991), p.233
18. The names of the authors should be written as follows: R Kuloba - In the case of more than one authors, the style should be as follows R Kuloba & P Mutiso and in case of more than two authors the style should be as follows R Kuloba (et al)
19. First reference to journal articles: D.M Duma, ‘Order 53: The Impact of Legal Notice No. 164 of 1992,’ [Volume] Ruaha Catholic University Law Journal (1995) 2.
20. Book Chapters: e.g. F.B Baron ‘The Universal Declaration of Human Rights’ in OS Scriver & AS McDonald, eds., *The United Nations and the Protection of Human Rights* (Rome: Keswick Publishers, 1990), pp.
21. References to statutes should not be in italics. Constitutions should be treated likewise.
22. Reference to cases should adhere to the respective Law Reports citation. The names of the cases should be in *italics*.
23. Websites should be cited as follows, for example <https://www.eastandard.com> (accessed on 14 July 2025).

24. Dates should be cited as follows: 23rd July 2025.

25. Official titles should be put in the Title Case: e.g. The President of the Republic of Tanzania. Capitals should be used sparingly.

NOTE; The submission will be submitted to reviewer(s) for evaluation. The Editorial Board reserves the right to change the manuscripts to make them conform to the EALJ house style, to improve accuracy, to eliminate mistakes and ambiguity, and to bring the manuscript in line with the tenets of plain legal language.

Preliminary information:

- 1) Title
- 2) Author(s) name, title, institution, address, telephone number, and e-mail address.
- 3) State to whom (if more than one author) correspondence should take place)
- 4) Abstract (max 300 words)
- 5) Keywords (maximum four)

Main Document- text (maximum 15 pages)

- 1) Introduction
- 2) Literature Review
- 3) Methodology
- 4) Results
- 5) Discussion
- 6) conclusion and recommendation
- 7) References
- 8) Appendixes (if any)

Number of Pages: The total number of pages should not exceed 20.

Abbreviation: abbreviations in the body of the paper should be used after having been initially explained.

References: OSCOLA style of Referencing version 6 is to be used
